From the Pastor...

At the end of the year 2019, our District Superintendent, Rev. Derek Nakano brought the concept of 'Liminality' based on the book, "HOW TO LEAD When You Don't Know Where You're Going" by Susan Beaumont. Regardless of how we are seeing ourselves, our local church or denominational church, one thing we are sure today is that we are constantly demanded to identify 'Who are, Who we serve, and What we feel called to do or become' during this liminal season. And this is how Susan describes the season: "Liminal seasons are threshold experiences where the continuity of tradition is called into question, and uncertainty about the future fuels doubt."

About 18 years ago, I was a newly married husband who left his wife behind in Korea and brought himself to New York city searching for a next step in the U.S., a foreign land. I commuted most days and walked for miles from a public bus station near Broadway to Battery Park in the South end. I was able to witness some of the busiest lifestyles in the city where the Empire State Building, Wall St, and Chinatown are. Other days I went the city but explored for the Northern part where Central Park is located, and there I felt close to some ordinary lifestyles: schools, churches, museums, parks, and food carts.

This experience oddly brought me a sense of 'diversity' and 'vitality' in life. And each day for the next two months in New York, the city truly gave different colors of the world not because of all the bright neon signs of the buildings, but because of such little communities created and alive in the large scaled community of Manhattan. Therefore, liminality for me is an ongoing effort of exploration in-between the South end and the North end, but not knowing exactly what each new day would bring through my walks in the city. The importance is "in the liminal period something marvelous and transforming can occur. *Communitas* might emerge."

As this year 2020 gets started, I would like you to join with me to experiment and learn about ourselves in a liminal manner. We may discover a new way of 'being' and re-discover ourselves fully alive and more open to divine encounters like I had 18 years ago, the most challenging moment of my life in the busiest city of the world. That doesn't mean I am an expert to lead you, but excited to have an adventurous walk with you to find 'Communitas' in our midst. This walking and working process in our liminal season requires much of personal presences as well as tangible actions. Therefore, I humbly ask for your stillness with solitude and your prayers with courage. Then, we'll come together to get clear about ourselves as a Blessed, Belonging, Beloved, and Believing Community.

This is my prayer that the Holy Spirit will strengthen our faith community here at MIUMC, so we can stand: watching to be witnesses of what God will do next and to follow God's lead.
