

Dear Mercer Island UMC families and friends,

Greetings to you all in the name of our Lord Christ Jesus who is the healer of all and the prince of peace to those who are in fear, pain, and loneness from our recent social distancing and isolation. It is my understanding that most of us are staying home and are healthy, keeping up the guidelines and updates being provided by our civil leaders and health care leaders. About a month ago, I invited us to observe a 40 Day Lent, to prepare for our Lord's passion and resurrection by practicing biblical 'godliness'. Our original focus was on how best to be holy or do holy works throughout this 'Spring-Lent' season as Christians, but the growing impact by the spread of COVID-19 limits our ability to be with one another in in-person worship and Bible studies nowadays.

Over 200 clergy members with our Bishop and her cabinet met virtually using the online meeting service, Zoom, yesterday. "We will continue suspending In-person worship and other gatherings through April...and All United Methodist church buildings and other facilities in the Greater Northwest are to be closed, effective March 28 to all but essential services and only to the extent allowed by state and local government restrictions or advice."

Which brings us finally to what we're going to do. We will keep our Facebook page updated with resources, including links to our online worship service which will be live-streamed and recorded, and also send out our daily email via Mia Park with members' notes, pictures, and prayer requests. I'm also planning to record videos for our faith studies with Rev. Carol Mariano, so if you'd like to participate, you will have a virtual opportunity to do just that.

Lastly, I am very grateful for you who are faithfully and willingly supporting our faith community in this challenging time with your gifts and offerings, making phone calls and writing cards to one another, and providing online worship and spaces to be connected. While we are parted and limited, let us not cease growing in love and spirit through 'Godly practices' you may have learned from recent messages: "Let peace begin with me; let this be the moment now. With every step I take, let this be my solemn vow; to take each moment and live each moment in peace eternally. Let there be peace on earth, and let it begin with me."



Meet Ann Knoll!

Mercer Island Methodist Church was organized in 1962, and now 58 years later, there are few of the charter members with us. However we are thankful and blessed to have one of those founding members with us every Sunday.

Eleanor Ann Thorne was born to Paul and Ada Thorne in 1925 in Kokomo, Indiana. She joined a sister, Miriam, who was 11 years older than she. During the depression years that followed, her family at times lived with her grandparents and several other relatives in a lively and loving household that cherished young Ann.

At Kokomo High School Ann sang in the glee club and wrote for the

school newspaper. She also sang with the Grace Methodist Church choir. She graduated from Kokomo High School in 1943 with the ambition of becoming a singer or a journalist. After studying for a year at Indiana University, she returned to Kokomo and joined the stenography pool at Continental Steel Company.

By then, the country was in the middle of World War II .The Bunker Hill Naval Air Station was located near Kokomo, and hundreds of naval cadets were training there to be pilots and naval officers. Ann's mother learned of a dance being held at the USO for those trainees, and she encouraged Ann to attend, explaining to her the advantages of meeting the select young men who were going to become naval officers. Ann was not particularly eager to go but finally decided to attend. A handsome young naval cadet, Bob Knoll from Corvallis, Oregon, was one of the young men



that Ann danced with that evening. Later Bob showed up at Grace Methodist Church where Ann was singing in the choir, and the flame of romance began to glow.



When Bob completed his training, he was sent to several other training stations around the country as an instructor, and the couple corresponded. In 1945 the war ended, and Bob returned to Corvallis and re-enrolled in Oregon State College.

In 1946 Bob borrowed his dad's Packard, and accompanied by a couple of buddies who were to be in the wedding, he drove to Kokomo to claim his bride. The trip east became a memorable one because of the many flat tires the young men had to cope with as they traveled. The wartime scarcity of tires had not ended yet. Bob and Ann were married on June 30, 1946,

in Grace Methodist Church in Kokomo. They honeymooned on the drive back to Corvallis, visiting Yellowstone and other scenic places along the way.

The couple remained in Corvallis after Bob's graduation. Ann became a housewife while Bob became the Director of the Alumni Association at Oregon State. Bob's position involved numerous gatherings and social activities, and Ann was always a gracious and charming hostess.

Over time four boys joined the family, and trips back to Kokomo and to the Oregon coast created happy memories. A family cabin in the mountains of Oregon by the McKenzie River was a beloved getaway where Bob and the boys fished, and Ann cooked their catch.

Ann, Bob and boys moved to Mercer Island in 1961 when Bob was recruited by Boeing for a position in the public relations department.

There was no Methodist church on Mercer Island at that

time, so the family attended Bellevue First Methodist Church, but soon they helped to organize and then became charter members of the Mercer Island Methodist Church. In the ensuing years they became the proverbial "pillars of the church", where they held many different offices and were always significant voices in the choir.

When the boys became older, Ann began a 25-plus year career with Farmer's Insurance Company on Mercer Island. She retired from the Human Resources Department there in 1990. The year before she retired she was selected from among the 300+ employees of Farmers as the Employee of the Year.

The Knolls enjoyed travel, and as Mariner fans, going to Mariner spring training in Arizona was a favorite destination. They also enjoyed regular trips to Hawaii, Cannon Beach and Seaside in Oregon, and excursions to Disneyland In California and Disney World in Florida.

All of the Knoll boys have remained in the Seattle area. Sadly, Paul who became an oncologist, passed away in 2008. David is now retired after 30 years with the Circulation Department of The Seattle Times, and John managed Skippers restaurants and also worked for SeaFirst/Bank of America before retirement. Mark worked for Farmers Insurance Company and for Wyndham Resorts. In addition to her sons and their wives, Ann now enjoys 5 grandchildren and I great grandchild.

Ann's love of music permeated the Knoll household, and all of her sons grew up to be talented and skilled vocalists.



David recalls how his mother listened to classical music in their home for as far back as he can remember. Until her eyesight began to fail, she was a prodigious reader, and g gardening was a lifelong interest. On nice days she and Mary Lou Lake could be found walking Ann's whippet dog around



Mercerdale Park.

Mercer Island United Methodist Church is blessed by Ann's many years of support of the church, and especially by the generous sharing of her musical talents. Her warm and friendly smile has welcomed the congregation since the church began in 1962. Thank you, Ann!


Celebrating Easter together during this time of physical separation
